Chair Report by Sue Hinton



Hello and welcome to my first report as Chair of the Executive. I would like to thank the outgoing members of our executive for their great contributions, and I would also like to welcome our new executive members and look forward to working with you all as we continue the fantastic work of the Tasmanian Women in Agriculture organisation.

The role of Chair is one I take on proudly. When I started out as a young professional in agriculture, we women were a bit of a rarity. In 1979 when I started my agricultural training, we had the largest intake of females ever in the Horticultural Technology course at 5. I graduated at the end of 1982 and worked in south-east Queensland as an agronomist with fresh market vegetable growers, some avocados, berries, stone fruit, cut flowers and a few other bits and pieces.

In mid-1986 I moved to Tasmania to get a little cool temperate agriculture experience. Maybe two or three years I thought. I have had 39 wonderful years working in Tasmanian agriculture. I am retired from fulltime work, but I am still very actively involved in the industry that I feel so connected to. I am keen to continue to support and mentor women in agriculture.

I came down to Tassie to work on the very early pyrethrum industry. I was involved with the early trials across the State and was involved with the first plantings on the north-west coast, that were done in early 1987. This was done with vegetative material, prior to the development of the ability to grow pyrethrum commercially from seed. Unfortunately, I am allergic to pyrethrum, so I needed to find something else to do.

This started another first for women and a great chapter for me personally. I became a poppy field officer for Tasmanian Alkaloids in early 1988. I was the first female poppy field officer ever. I worked with a terrific field team and built some good farmer networks. Related to poppies, a bit later I worked for GSK as the first female field officer they had. Another first. No-one else had been a field officer for both companies. I am now contributing in a different way, as an independent member of the Poppy Advisory and Control Board.

Many of us as women in agriculture, have just gone about our business of working in agriculture, not giving much thought to the fact that in many ways we have, and indeed in many cases, are still paving the way for the women that follow in our footsteps. I am proud of this personally and of the Tasmanian Women in Agriculture and the role we can play in supporting and enabling women right across agriculture.

Marcus Oldam Leadership Program (MORLP) Review

I had the privilege of attending the Marcus Oldham Rural Leadership Program in Geelong. A week that has left me with new perspectives, fresh energy and tools I'll carry forward, both personally and professionally.

The program brought together people from across Australia with a shared connection to agriculture, rural industries and regional communities. What stood out to me most was the diversity of voices in the room. We each came with different backgrounds and stories, yet we shared the common goal of becoming stronger leaders, not only in our workplaces but in our communities.

Over the week, we explored leadership through self-awareness, communication and the ability to truly listen. One of the biggest takeaways for me was the importance of setting aside assumptions and opinions, and instead creating space to understand others' perspectives. This shift in mindset, from speaking to listening, challenged me and will be a practice I continue to build on.

The sessions pushed us outside our comfort zones. From structured workshops to group challenges, every activity encouraged growth in resilience, collaboration and self-reflection. At times it was confronting, but always in the best way, because growth rarely happens when we stay comfortable.

What impressed me most was how the program balanced professional skills with personal development. Leadership, after all, is not just about strategy and decision-making. It's about empathy, authenticity and knowing yourself well enough to lead others with integrity.

I walked away from Marcus Oldham with stronger connections, a renewed sense of purpose, and practical tools I can apply in my role and beyond. Most importantly, I left with the reminder that leadership is not about having all the answers – it's about being willing to listen, learn and grow alongside others.

To anyone considering this program, I couldn't recommend it highly enough. It's not just a leadership course; it's an investment in yourself, your community and the future of rural Australia.

AgriFutures Rural Women's Award 2026 – Applications Now Open

The AgriFutures Rural Women's Award is Australia's premier award empowering rural, regional and remote women to bring their bold ideas and projects to life. Applications for 2026 opened on 10 September 2025 and close 7 November 2025. Finalists also become eligible for the TWiA Encouragement and Development Awards, celebrating local excellence and emerging leadership.

In 2025, Sarah De Jonge of Kingston was named the Tasmanian winner for her 1000 Hearts kindness initiative – a movement that distributes hand-sewn fabric hearts to individuals experiencing illness, hardship, or grief, offering comfort and human connection. As state winner, Sarah will represent Tasmania at the 2025 National Gala Dinner in Canberra on 28 October 2025.

The Award is open to all women aged 18 and over involved in rural industries, rural and regional businesses, or communities. Whether your project is established or emerging, the AgriFutures Rural Women's Award offers financial support, leadership development, national exposure and connection with a vibrant alumni network. Gourley's Sweet Shop Factory Tour by Libby Taylor

Following the 2025 TWiA Annual General Meeting, a group of members enjoyed a tour of Gourlay's Sweet Shop Factory, located within the Door of Hope Complex. We were also given the opportunity for a brief tour of the former Patons & Baldwins Woollen Mill.

We were told a brief history of the building when it operated as Patons & Baldwins, later as Coat's Paton and now by the Door of Hope.

Gourley's Famous Sweets was established in 1896 by William Gourley and was operated by many generations in the Quadrant, Launceston before it was sold to the present owners, the Wood family.

For many years they made only boiled sweets but now they make their own chocolate and chocolate covered range. We were shown the manufacturing process and given samples to taste.

It was most interesting, and wonderful, that Gourley's Sweet Shop is still operating and part of Launceston's history after nearly 130 years.





Sweet History Facts

- Founded 1896: William Gourlay opened Gourlay's Confectionery Shop (including a factory) on Elizabeth Street, Launceston. There are still items used to manufacture the sweets under the building.
- * Signature Lollies: Gourlay's produced Jockey Caps (still made today from the original recipe), Toffee Bars (broken by hammer), Acid Drops, Peach Bon-bons and Milkshake Syrups.
- Theatre Shop: A second shop once operated opposite the Majestic Theatre and would experience hectic rush periods in intervals when patrons rushed to buy sweets during theatre shows.
- Gourlay family until it was sold to the Wood family in 1970; the Woods later purchased the factory in 1978.
- Shop Relocation 1980: After the original Brisbane Street site was demolished, the shop moved to the Quadrant Mall in 1980.
- Royal in 1993 and more recently moved to the Door of Hope complex.
- ** Heritage Methods: Gourlay's continues to use original equipment and traditional techniques in its sweet-making operations.
- Retail & Factory Sites Today: The retail shop is in the Quadrant Mall; the factory is adjacent to Door of Hope in South Launceston.
- Chocolate & Lollies: The range now includes handcrafted chocolates, chewy toffees, boiled sweets, and nostalgic treats.
- Heritage Stewardship: Under the Wood family, Gourlay's retains its iconic name, quality, and connection to Tasmanian confectionery history.

How to Book a Gourlay's Sweet Shop 'Taste of History" Factory Tour

Want to see how Tasmania's most famous sweets are made? Gourlay's Sweet Shop runs guided factory tours at their Door of Hope site in South Launceston. Visitors can learn about the history of the business, see the traditional equipment in action, and taste a sample of freshly made treats. Bookings are essential.
